This “folder” consists of one sheet of paper, written on both sides, numbered p. 111 and 112. It may have been part of a larger summarization which Mr. Reese was doing. At any rate, the page must have been separated from pages before and after, and thus far it has not been possible to “patch together” the whole piece, from page 1 through p X. The items are arranged here in chronological order. They were not in chronological order on Mr. Reese’s paper. Halbur’s notes are in bold, in brackets.

1907

The village of Campbellsport passed a resolution to close Water St. toward the south. John Granger who also was a board member brought the action before the Board. Mr. Granger purchased the home and land from Elimira Eames [Sic] on December 8, 1907

1911

Meetings of Baptist Church refers to history. July 9, 1868 – School district # 2 of Auburn – Church activity

January 19, 1861 – in Orin Helmers Hall – Refers to location of Hall.

Oct. 21st 1854 – in District 12 of Crouchville School – refers to location

1924

On August 9th, a 6 inch rain fell overnight and flooded the whole plant area along the river’s west bank. It rained off and on for 11 days keeping the river at flood stage for 7 days. All the dug wells were contaminated and the farm crop was a severe loss because it could not be harvested.

The dam went out at Dundee and was rebuilt.

The dam went out at Kewaskum and was rebuilt.

The dam went out at New Prospect – wasn’t rebuilt.

The dam went out at Lake Bernice and was rebuilt.

The dam at Campbellsport washed a hole in the west end.

The bridge at Campbellsport was just being constructed.
The County Trunk V bridge went out by the county line south.
The State Highway 55 bridge went out by the county line south.
The railroad bridge was washed out at Kewaskum.
The locomotive of a freight train went into the ditch just north of the Highway 55 bridge at Kewaskum.
