



Regular Village Board Meeting
Monday, August 12, 2019 – 6 pm
Campbellsport Municipal Center
Community Room – 470 Grandview Avenue

1 The meeting was called to order at 6 pm by PR Krebs. All members were present (Serwe, Wenzlaff, Hafemann,
2 Zielieke, Krebs, Muraski, Harvey). The meeting notice was posted at the Campbellsport News, Library,
3 Campbellsport Municipal Center, and on the Village website.

4
5 The meeting started with a Public Hearing regarding issues with parking on Elm Street. Residents voiced concerns
6 over buses and trucks on the street, speed enforcement, unpainted crosswalks, vehicles parked near corners
7 blocking vision. Suggestions were made and the consensus was to try changes on a temporary basis. The public
8 hearing ended at 6:40 pm.

9
10 Motion and second made to monitor speed of vehicles traveling on North Elm Street and have crosswalks painted
11 and follow statutes regulating the distance vehicles need to park from a crosswalk and revisit this issue at the
12 September board meeting (Muraski, Harvey). All were in favor, motion carried 7-0.

13
14 The consent agenda was approved as presented (Zielieke, Hafemann). All were in favor, motion carried 7-0.

15
16 The operator licenses were approved as presented (Muraski, Wenzlaff). All were in favor, motion carried 7-0.

17
18 The invoices were approved as presented except a hold was placed on the Hopper's invoice for Cougar Dash T-shirts
19 until Brian Schill can research who should be paying the invoice (Zielieke, Hafemann). All were in favor, motion
20 carried 7-0.

21
22 Mario Millonzi of Upper 90 Energy, an Energy Services Company, presented the board with information to upgrade
23 outside and internal lighting at village properties. A brief audit of village buildings was performed in early August. At
24 the next meeting, Upper 90 Energy will propose an agreement for the cost of a study to possibly move forward with
25 upgrading lighting.

27 Shawn Krueger and Duane Feuerhammer represented Marie Feuerhammer to discuss the Timber Trails subdivision
28 water flow. The Feuerhammer family feels that runoff from the end of Baumann Street is limiting crops in the field
29 to the South. President Krebs explained that when looking at maps on the Fond du Lac County GIS, it is apparent
30 that the field had a water issue even prior to establishing the subdivision. The Village's position is that the
31 subdivision has been there for more than 20 years and there was a "gentleman's agreement" between Harold
32 Feuerhammer and a past Village President. At this late date, there are not options or funds available to make
33 significant changes. Public Works will remove snow from end of South Baumann Street to try to prevent
34 unnecessary water from running into the field. The Village and the Feuerhammer's will try to locate the original
35 storm sewer maps that would have been approved at the time the subdivision was developed. Gruber will remain in
36 touch with the Feuerhammer family.

38 Discussion took place on the Fire Department's request to increase fire contract amounts for the village and
39 townships in the Campbellsport Fire District. The Campbellsport Fire Department has always put \$28,000 from the
40 fire contracts into an equipment replacement fund. Due to the increased costs of equipment, the fire department
41 would like additional funds up to \$5,000 from each entity to put into the outlay fund. President Krebs explained that
42 the problem the village has is that growth has not taken place in the village to cause our levy to increase. There has
43 not been funding available in the budget to put money away into a fund for equipment replacement for Public
44 Works so it would be very hard to find any additional funds for the fire department contract increase. If we approve



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45 the increase, another department’s budget would need to be cut, and this is not fair given that departments are
46 already working with very tight budgets. Future discussion will take place about this topic at a budget meeting.

48 The Fire Department requested an ordinance allowing charges when they are called to false alarms. There has been
49 an ongoing issue with a facility in the Village that has “pull alarms.” Motion was made and seconded to approve
50 Ordinance 2019-43, Chapter 350 – False Alarms, with striking item C and adding “each calendar year” (Hafemann,
51 Wenzlaff). Motion carried 6-0, 1 abstention.

53 With the notification from SAFEbuilt that they would be ending our contract effective August 19, 2019, Tony “Doc”
54 Leonard indicated that he may continue servicing the Village as permit issuer if made an employee. Motion was
55 made and seconded to approve the Work Agreement for Tony “Doc” Leonard beginning August 20, 2019, (Zielieke,
56 Hafemann). All were in favor, motion carried 7-0.

58 Citizen Appearances

59 Bob Reese stated he would like to see the speed limit reduced by Highway 67 and Baumann Street. Gruber
60 indicated there is a meeting August 27 with the DOT that would include the portion of Highway 67 up to Baumann
61 Street. Due to this being a state highway, the Village can only pass the information on.
